DECISION

Dispute Codes OPR, MNR, MNSD, FF

Introduction

This hearing was convened by way of conference call in response to the landlord's application for an Order of Possession for unpaid rent; for a Monetary Order for unpaid rent; for an Order permitting the landlord to keep all or part of the tenants security deposit; and to recover the filing fee from the tenant for the cost of this application.

The tenant and landlord attended the conference call hearing, gave sworn testimony and were given the opportunity to cross examine each other on their evidence. The landlord ant provided documentary evidence to the Residential Tenancy Branch and to the other party in advance of this hearing. All evidence and testimony of the parties has been reviewed and are considered in this decision.

Issue(s) to be Decided

- Is the landlord entitled to an Order of Possession due to unpaid rent?
- Is the landlord entitled to a monetary Order to recover unpaid rent?
- Is the landlord entitled to keep the security deposit?

Background and Evidence

The parties agree that this month to month tenancy started on April 01, 2011. Rent for this unit is \$900.00 per month. Rent is due on the first of each month. The tenant paid a security deposit of \$450.00 on March 18, 2011.

The landlord testifies that the tenant failed to pay rent for May, June and July, 2013. The landlord issued a 10 Day Notice to End Tenancy for unpaid rent on June 12, 2013. This was served in person to the tenants on June 12, 2013. This Notice states that the tenant owes rent of \$900.00 that was due on June 01, 2013. The tenant had five days to either pay the outstanding rent, apply for Dispute Resolution or the tenancy would end on June 22, 2013. The tenant did not pay the outstanding rent or dispute the Notice within five days. Since that time the tenant has also failed to pay rent for July, 2013 to the sum of \$900.00. the landlord requests to amend the application to include the unpaid rent for May, 2013 of \$900.00. The total amount of outstanding rent is now \$2,700.00.

The landlord has applied to retain the tenant's security deposit in partial payment towards the rent arrears. The landlord has also applied for an Order of Possession to take effect within two days of service.

The tenant does not dispute the landlord's claim that she failed to pay rent for May, June and July, 2013. The tenant did not raise any objections to the landlords request to amend his application to include Mays rent for \$900.00.

Analysis

Section 26 of the Act states:

A tenant must pay rent when it is due under the tenancy agreement, whether or not the landlord complies with this Act, the regulations or the tenancy agreement, unless the tenant has a right under this Act to deduct all or a portion of the rent.

Consequently I am satisfied with the undisputed evidence before me that the tenant has failed to pay rent for May, June and July 2013. I will allow the landlord to amend the application to include unpaid rent for May as the tenant agrees this rent is also outstanding and raised no objections to the landlord's amendment of this monetary claim. The landlord is entitled to recover rent arrears to the sum of **\$2,700.00** pursuant to s.67 of the Act.

I order the landlord pursuant to s. 38(4)(b) of the *Act* to keep the tenant's security deposit of **\$450.00** in partial payment of the rent arrears.

As the landlord has been successful in this matter, the landlord is also entitled to recover the **\$50.00** filing fee for this proceeding pursuant to s. 72(1) of the *Act*.

The landlord will receive a Monetary Order for the balance owing as follows:

Outstanding rent	\$2,700.00
Less Security Deposit	(-\$450.00)
Plus filing fee	\$50.00
Total amount due to the landlords	\$2,300.00

I have reviewed all documentary evidence and accept that the tenant has been served with notice to end tenancy pursuant to section 88 of the *Residential Tenancy Act*. The notice is deemed to have been received by the tenant on June 12, 2013. The Notice states that the tenant has five days to pay the rent or apply for Dispute Resolution or the tenancy would end. The tenant did not pay the outstanding rent within five days nor applied to dispute the Notice to End Tenancy within five days.

Based on the foregoing, I find that the tenant is conclusively presumed, under section 46(5) of the *Act*, to have accepted that the tenancy ended on the effective date of the Notice and grant the landlord an order of possession pursuant to section 55 of the *Act*.

Conclusion

I HEREBY FIND in favor of the landlord's monetary claim. A copy of the landlord's decision will be accompanied by a Monetary Order for **\$2,300.00**. The order must be served on the Respondent and is enforceable through the Provincial Court as an order of that Court.

I HEREBY ISSUE an Order of Possession in favour of the landlords effective **two days** after service on the tenant. This order must be served on the Respondent and may be filed in the Supreme Court and enforced as an order of that Court.

This decision is made on authority delegated to me by the Director of the Residential Tenancy Branch under Section 9.1(1) of the *Residential Tenancy Act*.
